
TREASURER'S REPORT


The year-end finances of SNEB show a \$7,676 loss for 2018-2019 versus a budgeted loss of \$3,870. Conference losses and lack of sponsorship revenue were offset by costs savings by JNEB.

The 2019 loss pushed net assets to \$700,655 as can be seen in Table A. The results for the 2020 fiscal year end are not yet complete, but it is anticipated that SNEB will realize a loss due to lower registration revenue for the virtual conference.

Membership revenue declines are also anticipated since join and save registrations are the single greatest new member recruitment tool. Trends in these revenue categories are illustrated in Table B.
