Covid-19 in New York City

- Probable high levels of unknown cases in February and early March
- Hospitals overwhelmed and high deaths late
 March through early May

Officials in New York City say they plan to deliver more than a million free meals a day beginning next week. The number of people going hungry in the five boroughs has risen sharply during the COVID-19 pandemic.








The response was swift and massive

- In April 2020 NYC distributed 10M meals.
- This is led by the free school meals which is distributing 450,000 a day, half for children and half for adults









More change into the future

- As the pandemic changes new threats and opportunities will arise
- The region's food system will continue to be disrupted and perhaps damaged.









Why evaluate?

 Monitoring the implementation of these new Covid-19 related programs can assess their impact on communities, institutions, and the food system as a whole.







Three of NYC's leading food policy research centers are collaborating on this evaluation







The CUNY Urban Food Policy Institute is a research and action center based at the CUNY Graduate School of Public Health & Health Policy.

Provides evidence and advocacy that helps to create healthier, more sustainable, and equitable urban food systems.

The Tisch Food Center is a research and advocacy center housed in the Program in Nutrition at Teachers College Columbia University.

Conducts research on food and nutrition education practice and policy to give people power to demand healthy, just, sustainable food.

The Hunter Food policy Center is an academic research center on Hunter College's East Harlem Campus in the School of Urban Public Health.

Through interdisciplinary research, policy analysis, evaluation, and education the center leverages the expertise and passion of the NYC food policy community.

Research frame question:

What is the impact of Covid-19 on food access and food resources in New York City communities with a focus on underserved and/or disproportionately affected communities?



Sub-questions



- What food resources closed? Comparisons between underserved and other communities?
- For open food resources what were the barriers and facilitators to access?
- What food resources and information did individual and communities access?
- How has food retail changed?





Research frame question:

How are NYC agencies providing meals in response to Covid-19?



Sub-questions



- What federal, state, and city policies influence institutional food service?
- What is working and needs to change for institutional meals to best provide food to vulnerable New Yorkers?
- What does a case study about school meals reveal about challenges and opportunities during Covid-19?
- How can the institutional food response to Covid-19 guide response to future crises?





Research frame question:

What is the impact of Covid-19 on interactions among the components of the food systems across NYC, Hudson Valley and Eastern Long Island(e.g., growers, processors, distributors, retailers)?





Sub-questions

- What are the common and differing needs during Covid-19 for consumers, food retailers, and food growers?
- How is the Covid-19 response changing the food workforce, their salaries and conditions?
- How is Covid-19 changing the regional food system?
- How can Covid-19 related innovations and problems advance regional and municipal food planning?

- Cumulative impact of Covid-19 on food security in NYC











