The Society for Nutrition Education and Behavior (SNEB) Fellows designation is a prestigious honor awarded to distinguished members who have demonstrated exceptional achievements in the field of nutrition education and behavior. This designation recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions through research, practice, education, and leadership within the domain of nutrition education. Fellows are celebrated for their exemplary service, dedication, and impact on the advancement of nutrition education and public health.

Fellows of SNEB are role models within the community, providing mentorship and guidance to emerging professionals and contributing to the strategic goals and initiatives of the Society. Their expertise and leadership help shape the future of nutrition education and enhance the effectiveness of interventions aimed at improving dietary behaviors and health outcomes. Fellows will be called upon for mentorship and leadership roles within SNEB.

SNEB Fellows Receive:

- Entitlement to use the FSNEB designation in credentials
- Recognition as a Fellow of SNEB on the SNEB website and in JNEB
- Use of the FSNEB logo
- A Fellow of SNEB certificate
- Toolkit to promote FSNEB status to employers and local press

Requirements for Fellowship Nomination and Selection

- 1. *Membership*: Nominees must be current members of SNEB and have maintained active membership for a minimum of five consecutive years.
- 2. *Professional Experience:* Nominees should have at least ten years of professional experience in the field of nutrition education and behavior.
- 3. *Contributions to the Field:* Demonstrated significant contributions to the field through research, practice, policy, or education. This may include published research, development of educational programs, influential policy work, or other relevant accomplishments.
- 4. *Leadership:* Evidence of leadership within the profession, such as holding key positions within SNEB, other professional organizations, academic institutions, or public health initiatives. Leadership roles may include serving on boards, committees, task forces, or as an advisor or consultant.

- 5. *Recognition and Awards:* Previous recognition of professional achievements, such as awards, honors, or other forms of professional acknowledgment from reputable organizations or institutions.
- 6. *Service to SNEB:* Active participation and service within SNEB, including involvement in committees, special interest groups, annual conference presentations, or other contributions that support the Society's mission and goals.
- 7. *Mentorship and Education:* Commitment to mentoring and educating the next generation of nutrition educators and practitioners. Evidence of mentoring students, early-career professionals, or colleagues in the field.
- 8. *Professional Conduct:* Adherence to high ethical standards and professionalism, contributing to the positive reputation and integrity of the nutrition education and behavior field.

Cost

• \$150 one time fellows fee due upon acceptance

Application Process

- 1. *Submission:* Applications should be submitted by the prospective fellow and are due by January 31 each year.
- 2. *Supporting Letters:* At least one letter of support from a current SNEB member, and one letter of support from a professional within the field who can attest to the applicant's contributions and suitability for the Fellow designation.
- 3. *Review and Selection:* The SNEB Executive Committee reviews all nominations and evaluates them based on the criteria outlined. The committee then recommends candidates for approval by the SNEB Board of Directors.
- 4. Announcement and Recognition: Newly designated Fellows are announced during the SNEB Annual Conference, where they are formally recognized for their achievements and contributions to the field.

Becoming a Fellow of the Society for Nutrition Education and Behavior signifies a high level of professional accomplishment and commitment to the field of nutrition education, underscoring the individual's role as a leader and innovator in improving public health through education and behavior change. SNEB will accept up to 10 Fellows per year.
